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A presentation is composed of three parts

Each part has subtopics

Structure:

- Facilitates the presentation
- Facilitates your audience to better understand the content



Conclusions



Introduction

The final part of your presentation can have:

- Summary
- Concluding points
- Recommendations
- Future research or points to consider in the future
- Thank you
- Questions/Answers

Summary



Conclusion



conclusion: the opinion you have after considering all the information about something

A review of your title or subject area

“In this presentation I wanted to explore the relationship between X and Y.”;

Summary:

“To this end, we have discussed the following points...”;

Conclusion

“By looking at X we have found that Y ...”;



Recommendations

- Succinct
- Start with an action verb

“Use creativity! Creativity will make your presentation unique!”

Future research

- Building on findings you presented
- Aspects not addressed
- Show limitations of your research.
- Address new questions you may have

Points to remember:

- Avoid introducing new information
- Must have a clear end to the talk
- End positively (Thank you and acknowledge someone's help)



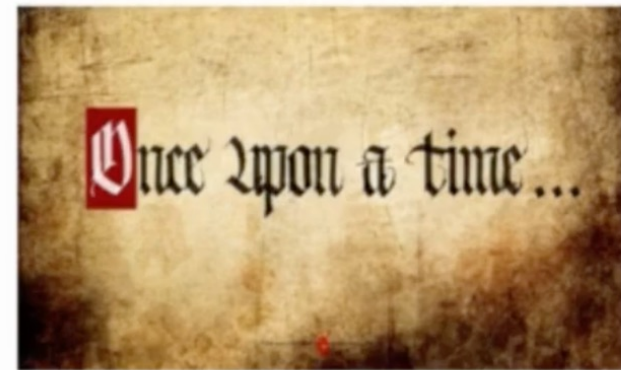
Beginning –Introduction

Should be carefully designed

- Introduce yourself
- Title, Purpose and Objective
- Preview the main points

Beginning – Get attention

- Shock
- Humour
- Picture
- Question
- Story/example
- Facts and Figures



Example engaging introduction

- Shock
- Present the Purpose
- Humour
- Analogy



Beginning - Motivate

- Why should I pay attention?
- Now that I am listening, why should I care about this subject/topic?
- I agree with the significance of the subject – but how are you justifying your ideas?
- Now that I am convinced – what do you want from?
